## Jerzy Klosin and Regina Malczewski named 2019 ACS Fellow Amanda Palumbo, Chair, Midland Section ACS



**Jerzy Klosin** (left), Dow Fellow, and **Regina Malczewski** (right), Dow Corning retiree, of the Midland Section have been named <u>2019 American Chemical Society (ACS) Fellow</u>. They are among 70 scientists who have been recognized for their outstanding achievements in chemistry and important contributions to ACS and their profession. The 2019 Fellows will be honored at a special ceremony during the ACS National Meeting & Expo in San Diego, California on August 26, 2019.

Klosin is being recognized for the development of commercially relevant homogenous catalysts for large scale industrial processes and educating and mentoring younger scientists. In addition, he is an active contributor to ACS, serving passionately on the Joined Board-Council Committee on Publications, C&EN Board, Editorial Advisory Board of Organometallic and organizing conferences in the areas of organometallic chemistry and olefin polymerization.

Malczewski is being recognized for advancing industry standards and test methods for healthcare and personal care, in addition to her leadership in silicone materials development for antimicrobials, drug delivery, and pharmaceutical processing. Additionally, she is recognized for her long-standing service to the ACS in

many capacities, as well as for her demonstrated excellence in leadership, and enthusiasm, innovation, and relentless commitment to STEM outreach.

Klosin and Malczewski join 11 other Midland Section members in the rank of ACS Fellow since the program began [Midland Chemist, January 2019, Vol. 56, No. 1]. The Fellows Program was created by the ACS Board of Directors in December 2008 to recognize members of ACS for outstanding achievements in and contributions to science, the profession, and the Society.

## ACS National Meeting Symposium – Chemists Without Borders: Celebrating 15 Years of Scientific/Humanitarian Collaboration *Ronda Grosse, Board Member, Chemists Without Borders*

At the invitation of the American Chemical Society, Chemists Without Borders (CWB) has organized a symposium for the 2019 Fall National ACS meeting in San Diego, California. As the overall meeting topic is "Chemistry & Water", a number of clean water projects will be discussed. Additionally, the symposium will cover other applications of chemistry to humanitarian work including sustainability and climate change topics. Hands-on science training and field work in Latin America, combating heavy metal contamination in Bangladesh, and establishing an AIDSfreeAFRICA laboratory in Cameroon will also be discussed. Presenters include representatives from universities, industry, and nonprofit organizations.

Progress on projects documented in the book "Mobilizing Chemistry Expertise to Solve Humanitarian Problems" will be covered, with focus on new authors' contributions. This ACS symposium, to be held on Sunday morning, August 25, is titled "Chemists Without Borders: Celebrating 15 Years of Scientific/Humanitarian Collaboration", in recognition of CWB work to date. Both the Multidisciplinary Program Planning Group and Environmental division of the ACS are sponsoring this symposium. Directly following, the Chemistry & Water opening plenary session on Sunday afternoon will feature one of CWB's founders, Bego Gerber, on the panel. We hope to see you in San Diego!




