

Dr. Zank Featured Speaker at ACS Banquet

Dr. Gregg Zank, chief technology officer of Dow Corning Corporation, was the featured speaker at a banquet sponsored by the Midland Section of the American Chemical Society, held at Ashman Court Hotel on Tuesday, September 21, 2004. The meeting was attended by about 35 people who heard Gregg speak on "Innovation, Is It the Answer?" Gregg spoke about the importance of innovation for the future competitiveness of the chemical industry, stressing the fact that global competition is becoming much more intense, the industry is mature, and the cost of doing business is increasing for a number of reasons.



So what is the future of the chemical industry in the context of this pessimistic scenario? Gregg was clearly bullish on the future of Dow Corning, stressing that innovation is their answer. It is and will continue to be the engine that drives their growth and profitability. He finished by discussing some fundamentals for innovation and growth in large companies. 

Scholarship Fund Drive Needs Your Support!

n October 2003, the Midland Section of the American Chemical Society launched its Inaugural Fund Drive for an endowed scholarship fund. This endowment was initiated with the Midland Area Community Foundation at the threshold level of \$5,000. The ultimate endowment fund goal drive is \$100,000. which would enable the funding of five an-

nual scholarships of \$1,000 or more to students seeking academic degrees in the chemical sciences at colleges and universities in the Midland Section's five-county area. The Section's area consists of Midland, Bay, Saginaw, Gratiot, and Isabella counties. The first scholarship will be awarded in 2005.

At the half-way point in October 2004, the fund stood at \$30,300. This is good, but much more help is needed if we are to reach our goal of \$100,000! Help of Section members is really needed at this time. Contributors to this drive will be permanently recognized as Inaugural Fund Drive donors. The Inaugural Fund Drive ends September 30, 2005.

For many years the Midland Section has had an active portfolio of outreach programs to further the mission of the American Chemical Society which is "to encourage in the broadest and most liberal manner the advancement of the chemical enterprise and its practitioners." This scholarship fund will make a significant addition to the Section's outreach portfolio. Educational costs have risen faster than inflation, requiring a constant need for monetary reinforcement to support academic pursuits.

Unique to this new outreach program is that every member of the Section has an opportunity to make an everlasting contribution to its success by giving to the fund. A contribution card and return envelope are included with this issue of *The Midland Chemist*. Simply check "other" on the contribution card and fill in the blank line with "Midland Section ACS

Fund." Send your contribution, either by check or credit card charge, to the Midland Area Community Foundation, P.O. Box 289. Midland. MI 48640-0289, Gifts can also include stock. bonds, or real estate (these require contacting Nicole Lomas of the Foundation at 989-839-9661). Remember that your contributions can be deducted on your 2004 tax return.

The scholarships will be available to sophomore, junior, and senior students majoring in a chemical science. The requirements for receiving a scholarship will be based on academic achievement and potential for contributions to the chemical sciences. Selection of scholarship recipients will be carried out by a Scholarship Awards Committee duly elected by voting members of the Board of Directors of the Section. Sci-Fest 2004 Promotes Health and Wellness

The 2004 National Chemistry Week theme, Health and Wellness, permeated Sci-Fest, held at Delta College on Saturday, October 23, 2004, from 10:30 a.m. until 2:30 p.m. with 1000 to 1500 participants. The American Chemical Society Midland Section, Mid-Michigan Technician Group, and Delta College sponsored the event with financial support from The Dow Chemical Company and Dow Corning Corporation. Members of the committee developed several ideas around the theme and shared these with the exhibitors.

Topics included but were not limited to dental health (participants weighed out the amount of sugar in a can of pop), fitness, brain injury prevention, germs, environmental health, chemistry and nursing, cancer services, permanent makeup, West Nile virus, and major elements in the human body. The Younger Chemists Committee sponsored a health walk with stations for exercises. There were several other activities that promoted mental health, detected skin UV exposure, taught proper hand washing, discussed air and water quality, and proper nutrition. The Michigan Community Blood Center of Saginaw Valley was present to do blood typing and take blood donations, netting 15 units of blood.

Creative Spirit Center, Inc., a nonprofit organization that provides a nurturing place for people of all ages to experience the creative process, held center stage for all four hours. Through the guidance of individuals



from the Center, Sci-Fest attendees were active partipants of the Native American Flute Circle, Yoga, Drumming Circle, and Tibetan Bowl and Overtones.

Approximately 29,500 flyers were distributed to Bay City, Coleman, Freeland, Meridian, Midland City, Bullock Creek, Mt. Pleasant Schools, and Saginaw School districts and to St. Brigid, Blessed Sacrament, and St. John Lutheran parochial schools in Midland, and Sacred Heart Mt. Pleasant. Flyers were also delivered to Aabizakaawin and Saginaw Chippewa Academy in Mt. Pleasant. The event was advertised in the Tri-City newspapers, TV bulletin boards, through a 4minute segment on
