I just successfully used an alpine butterfly for the first time. The alpine butterfly is a knot that I just learned, useful because it places a sturdy loop in the middle of a rope. Scouting taught me how to tie a number of knots, now well over 50 years ago. I've spent 50 years unhappy with the knot I learned for placing a loop in the middle of a rope. The alpine butterfly does it quickly and is a good knot. The alpine butterfly, and my learning it, brings to mind two concepts that bear on the local ACS section and its members.

A good knot delivers performance. It holds and doesn't slip. Often overlooked, a good knot is easy to untie. A good knot can be undone effortlessly so that the rope can move on to the next challenge. A good knot is actually a commitment to contingency planning, recognition the

knot is ephemeral. The Midland Fall Scientific Meeting is moving virtual thanks to Covid-19. Like a good knot, the planning committee is now unwinding the existing, in-person plans. I want to thank them for the hard work they've already done, offer my sympathies that their careful planning is largely scuttled, and thank them for the effort they are putting into making a great virtual meeting. I commend them for the contingency planning that is allowing them to pivot well. Like a good knot, they thought about how to untangle their efforts.

Learning a new knot after age 60 offers some hope that old dogs can learn new tricks. I put myself to the task of learning a better knot long after I should have. I've suffered the tedium of untying poorly configured loops in ropes for years. Many in the Midland Section are facing new challenges, not with rope, but with virtual meeting software.

Virtual tools are pushing many to learn new software. I implore you to rise to the challenge, just as I did with the alpine butterfly. These tools are well within reach of all and the Fall Meeting will rely on them as a strong foundation. There is a lot at stake.

I've grown tired of virtual meetings. The enjoyment I get from a live meeting just doesn't happen at a virtual one. I will, however, be attending the virtual Fall Scientific Meeting. Please join me, to make this a great virtual meeting. The meeting is one of the places that young researchers in our area get their first exposure presenting their results. All of us were once in their shoes. Science was our passion. We'd just worked really hard at understanding something new, not only new to us, but new to science. We had results and we wanted to share them. Let's not let this generation miss their opportunity. Don't let Covid wreck their opportunity.

If you are older, please recall your younger self and commit to attending the virtual Fall Scientific Meeting. If you are sick of virtual meetings, please rise above it. If you have exciting results to share, please submit them. The meeting will be Saturday, October 10. Let's make this an exceptional virtual meeting.



A Digital STEAM Camp Tackles Summer Boredom Gina Malczewski, Outreach Committee, Midland Section ACS

Thirty-one middle school students were accepted for the third annual STEAM Stew camp sponsored by Midland ACS and MSU-St. Andrews—but everything was virtual this year! The campers hailed mostly from the Great Lakes Bay area, but some attended from southern Michigan. The camp was free, with online presentations (by Zoom) from 9 am to approximately noon July 13-17, and some intermittent offline activities.

The technology, arranged by MSU, included notepads and hotspots (where necessary) that were loaned to campers already loaded with the apps needed for the week's activities: Google Classroom (GC), iNaturalist SEEK, and the "Solve the Outbreak" game from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC). ACS arranged for all the science content and collected all the necessary supplies, which were sent to students along with the tablets. All students also received a camp shirt (see design below).



Students learned 3-D printing virtually and wrote files to print objects (which will be made and sent to them soon). Victoria Zablocki of the Chippewa Nature Center presented on the chemistry of plants and taught them how to use the SEEK app to identify flowers, trees, grasses and other living objects. Their photos of local flora and fauna were stored in GC, along with nature art they did using solar paper.

Campers also experienced a "live hive" with entomologist Elly Maxwell of Dow Gardens, and learned all about bees, wasps—and even murder hornets! Another camp segment offered hands-on testing and categorization of rocks and minerals—followed by a mineral-inspired plaster casting project. Sandy LaPradfrom the Midland County Health Department informed campers about what Public Healthworkers do, and they learned more through solving scenarios presented by the CDC game.

One recurring theme throughout the weekwas "Energy Bar Entrepreneurship"; students taste-tested commercial bars and rated them, learned about nutrition che mistry,

made their own simple bars by ACS recipes (from materials provided), chose their favorite, and developed promotion and packaging for this product based on guidance provide by MSU experts Dante Pirouz and Alyssa Harben. A competitive puzzlegame reviewing the week's activities finished out the campon Friday.

Parents were encouraged to supervise and follow along when possible; one commented: "It was wonderful to see [my son] engaged in the STEAM activities. The camp provided a terrific blend of diverse learning opportunities, incorporating many aspects of STEAM. [He] really seemed to enjoy the Energy Bar Entrepreneurship project which really showcased how all of these disciplines blend together in the real world. The camp was well organized and each presenter brought enthusiasm and knowledge to the camp."

There were many challenges involved in setting up and conducting the camp, not the least of which was keeping children engaged long-distance after almost a semester of on-line school. As notepads are returned and more feedback collected, we hope to use this experience to help us create options for the rest of 2020, as virtual learning—for now-- continues to replace in-person experiences.

We are grateful for the many ACS and MSU volunteers that helped with facilitation, technology, and supply-packing.


